The East Africa Association of Waldorf Steiner Schools (EAAWSS) continued its important role through 2023 connecting the East African Waldorf/Steiner Schools and initiatives together. They meet approximately three times a year.

Under the care of the Association is the Waldorf Teacher Training course which takes place at Rudolf Steiner School, Mbagathi, Nairobi. The course is run three times a year. Teachers attend modules which run for two consecutive weeks.

A leadership course also runs under the umbrella of EAAWSS, lead by Troels Ussing.

*A new developing initiative is emerging – an introductory course in Anthroposophy through Troels, Patrick and Esther Nyagah.* 

The chairman of the Association is Kasmir Msigwa who also represents the schools in the International Forum.

It is important to share that the East African Schools have been facing severe financial struggles, threatening their very existence and this is important to keep in mind as we read about them.

At last, we get to a space relatively calm enough to plan and actualize our long awaited in person **Anthroposophical Conference**. We have been planning behind the scenes and we bring the good news that between **1**<sup>st</sup> and **5**<sup>th</sup> **April 2024** we will have an East Africa gathering for this purpose, coming together again. ### HEKIMA WALDORF SCHOOL - TANZANIA

Waldorf education in Tanzania was pioneered by a group of dynamic Tanzanians who formed the **Waldorf** *Education Trust* [*WET*] as an NGO in 1997. These dynamic parents were the late Hon. MP. Richard Nyaulawa, the late Rashid Mbuguni, together with their spouses.

The Trust was registered in 1997, with the objective of promoting creative, modern education in the country based on the Waldorf pedagogy. The WET in Tanzania is under the Board of Trustees which is the custodian of the Waldorf Education mission in Tanzania.



In the same year (1997) the Waldorf Education Trust established **Hekima Waldorf School.** The latter is the first Waldorf School in Tanzania whose curriculum is child centered which seeks to address the **physical**, **emotional**, **spiritual** as well as the **intellectual** aspects of a growing child.

The school consists of two cohorts: The Kindergarten Cohort and the Primary School Cohort. The school is run by the College of Teachers who work hand in hand with the Board of Directors who represent each class starting from the Kindergarten. **Casmir Msigwa** 







#### THE RUDOLF STEINER SCHOOL MBAGATHI - KENYA

The Rudolf Steiner School Mbagathi is situated south of Nairobi National Park based on a 20 acre plot. The school has a total of 400 children. The kindergarten has four groups and the primary goes from class 1 to 9. Our classes are full, with children waiting to join.

The school has a Board of Trustees, and the idea to have a Steiner School came from our trustee Nani Croze. The mission of the school is to help children through Waldorf Education with life challenges, therefore our school runs on 80% sponsorship and 20% fee paying. Our sponsor children come from socially and financially challenged backgrounds with difficult family situations.



We have a boarding facility now capable of housing 132 children who are lovingly taken care of by our boarding parents. They receive regular healthy meals and recreation time over the weekends. We strive to support these children with Steiner education, healthy meals and a secure and loving environment to learn.

The school also has a farm with milking cows and a large vegetable garden. The farm has been organic for many years and is now following the bio-dynamic practices. It is a very important part of the school, offering healthy products and a green environment. **Judith Brown – School Leader**





#### A Seamless Transition: School Successfully Relocates to a New Campus

### WALDORF WOODLANDS SCHOOL

With hearts full of excitement after a long break, we embarked on the new school year 2023-2024 through our enchanting Rose Ceremony. This beautiful beginning set the stage for a series of memorable events and work, including parent meetings, the Festival of Courage, Costume Day, Cross Country and more. Our small, close-knit community, comprising 16 children from Kindergarten to Grade 5, along with a dedicated faculty of 5, is now fully immersed in our academic rhythm.



Our festivals continue to offer a great opportunity for parents not only to take part in their children's education but also to make many exciting memories to celebrate their children's educational journey.

In our Playgroup and Kindergarten, our emphasis is on practicing gentle hands and kind language, while Grade 1 explores the wonders of the alphabet, Grade 3 delved into tales and legends of indigenous people and Hebrew stories, while Grade 4 is uncovering local history and geography, and Grade 5 embarked on a journey through ancient history.



To the advantage of our practicable numbers, we have recently taken to more outdoor adventures for grades 3, 4 and 5 in line with our core curriculum to foster the development of important practical skills, including putting up shelter to keep warm and dry, camping, crafting with available materials, plant observation, basic orienteering (drawing and using a map and compass in the wild), farming, wildlife identification and observation as well as other outdoor survival techniques.

As we approach the end of term one, we extend our heartfelt appreciation to every member, mentor and friend of our community for contributing to the magical memories that define Waldorf Woodlands School. We especially want to give special thanks to Gisela Hildegard who has brought our community the gift of eurythmy this term and

Geraldine Emejom for her continued support with our teachers.

### **IN-HOUSE WALDORF TEACHER TRAINING COURSE**

#### TRANSIONAL CYCLE SUPPORTED BY THE GERMAN GOVERNMENT

This cycle kicked off after the Covid situation eased with module 1 in December 2021. In the year 2022 and 2023 the thread has worked out uninterrupted, so we have managed to have 3 modules, in April, July and December in both years taking us to Module 7 in December 2023. The trainees come from Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania, Madagascar, Ivory Coast, Ethiopia and Zimbabwe.







- The Objective of this Cycle is to prepare East African Trainers to take full charge of the training after 2024. Under the mentorship of well abled Trevor Mepham [ UK ] and Maria Msambezi [ SA ] , fifteen trainers [ 15 ] have got a chance at least once to have a practical session of training and be mentored on the specific content they handled.
- The content of the modules has been spiced up by making some additions to the programme like Games, Music and Gardening.
- Peter van Alphen, Ann Sharfman and Simon Shirley have been very instrumental too in the first half of the cycle in supporting the trainers in training from near and far when need arose.
- We are grateful for the financial support given by all funders and sponsors; BMZ through Nana Göbel of Freunde der Erziehungskunst Rudolf Steiners e.V. who made this project possible, GLS, IHF, and all the schools' managements from which the trainees come. This way we have enough supply of learning materials and meals.
- We would have no training without the space, thanks to RSSM for being a kind and generous host and for its management for helping in the running and the structuring of the EATT.
- We pride in the completion of the trainers' house funded by BMZ and acquisition of some new IT materials which includes 2 laptops, projector, projector screen and visualizer. These items are of great help in class presentations during the training. The EATT Webpage is up and in use though still work in progress.
- We are building on EA mentors to work from within, and mentor trainees in the region are already in the training in readiness for their graduation. Ruth Thuku and Silviah Njagi are the identified local trainee mentors already doing a good job in this field. The kindergarten mentorship is fully supported by IASWECE. We are currently looking for financial support to enable us to send out local Primary school mentors to different schools.
